



Age appropriate use of the Internet and other electronics and media is a frequent topic of concern for parents. I am gratified to learn how thoughtfully and responsibly parents are engaging the need for guidance and boundaries when it comes to their children's exposure to media and use of computers.

First, it is important to understand that everyone agrees that a computer is a marvelous tool and provides many opportunities for learning, sharing and discovering new things. The challenges arise when we recognize that media also shapes our family and collective culture. A diet of violent imagery and games is known to negatively impact the sensitivities of children and young adults. Increasingly, cyber bullying inflicts emotional damage or even traumatizes youth.

So, our task as parents and teachers is two-fold. We must create balance in our

children's lives to support their optimal emotional, physical and intellectual wellbeing. Additionally, we must educate our children to constructively employ the opportunities for learning and experiencing the best intellectual and aesthetic content of media and the Internet. Many educators, neuropsychologists and scientists have been tracking the impact of computers on the brain and our culture for more than 20 years. Their conclusion is that our children need to develop critical thinking skills at an earlier age and they need to reflect on their intent when exploring resources as well as understanding how visual media impacts their emotions and thoughts.

There is no avoiding the fact that our children are growing up in a rapidly changing culture, which differs greatly from the culture of our own childhoods. In a consumer-based economy, the competition to capture the attention of youth and adults is fierce. The neuroscience of addictive

behaviors is understood and employed to hold onto our attention.

We must constantly strive as parents and educators to create healthy limits for use of, and exposure to, media of all varieties and be sure to provide a balance of physical, sensorial and practical experiences in the daily lives of our children.

Please visit MontessoriSynergies.com and look for the well-researched guidelines listed under media literacy; follow-up this information with family discussions and critical assessment of the information and resources which your children encounter. Your children are caught in the river of media. Teach them to swim!

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Meet Heather Mosby - Assistant Teacher in the Middle School

It is a well known fact that once someone starts working at AMS they usually stay for a good long time, but few have had a life-long relationship with AMS the way that Middle School Assistant Directress Heather Mosby has. She was born while her mother, Middle School Directress Melody Mosby was teaching at AMS, is a graduate of the school and has now returned to teach. Here we learn a little bit about what that experience has taught her.

1) I understand you were born while your Mom was working at AMS. What is your earliest memory of the school?

My earliest memory of AMS is filled with music. Warren, who was serving as both Director and Primary teacher at the time, was my teacher and Anne Marie was his assistant. There was a piano in the classroom and Warren would sit down and play songs for us all to sing together in circle. Warren's animated personality and love of music and the arts made every day at school an adventure.

I left AMS to move to the Virgin Islands with my family where I attended a Montessori School in St. Thomas. When we moved back to Georgia, I returned to AMS for 6th, 7th, and 8th grade. I graduated from the Middle School program when it was held in the basement of Warren and LaVonne's home, before the new building was constructed here on campus.

2) Did you ever imagine that you would come back and be a teacher?

In college, the courses that I found most interesting were sociology and psychology. This interest directed me toward the non-profit sector where I worked with Project Safe and Advantage Behavioral Health. I knew I wanted to work with people and be a part of finding solutions for society's social problems and what better way is there to create a better future than working with the youngest members of our society.

3) What is the greatest lesson you learned from Melody?

There are countless lessons to be learned from a teacher with 30 years experience and a MACTE accredited adolescent teacher training program under her belt. One of the greatest lessons I've learned from Melody is that learning is a lifelong experience. Certification is not the final step in becoming a great Montessori guide, it is only the first step. It is continued teacher education, observation of the students, and planning and flexibility that enables the teacher to provide an optimal learning environment.

4) How do you feel your relationship with Melody helps you work together as a team?

I believe our personal relationship complements our professional relationship. It is comparable to a partnership where two people have worked together for an extended amount of time. You have the advantage of knowing your co-worker's next move and understanding their intentions without a verbal explanation. We have also found that consulting each other on decisions and staying in constant communication makes everything run smoother and more efficiently. Having a strong team is particularly important when working with teens and the Middle School program is now stronger then ever with two fully trained adolescent Montessori guides.

5) What is your favorite part of teaching in the AMS Middle School?

It is fascinating to see the adolescent move into this new stage of development. They are able to take all the knowledge and skills they have acquired in the primary and elementary levels and apply it in real and relevant ways. As they develop their abstract minds, they become great problem solvers and independent thinkers. It is also wonderful to work in such a caring community with such a highly talented and supportive staff.



One month after arriving in Athens, coming from Belgium, 2nd year ACES student Anna deJaeger said to her mother: "Mom, I've always liked going to school, but now I realize what I've missed all those years. School in Belgium was boring compared to now!" Anna and her mom share what they think is so great about AMS with us here:

Of course I was happy to hear this. It meant she was adapting well. In Belgium she went to a public school (we only have public schools), so it is not completely fair to compare with the Montessori school she's attending now. But still, when I ask her what she likes so much about this school, these were her answers:

- -There are no working benches all in rows on which everybody does the same at the same moment. Here I can decide where and when I do my work (which can be stressful at certain moments too!) -I have the possibility to be creative when I've finished my work. I can write plays! And play music (ukelele).
- The students are nice to each other and don't argue all the time. You can feel that they treat each other with respect. I've had so much help from the Aces students and teachers. They gave me time to adapt.
- -The science lessons are more fun. We work with real materials as examples, so everything is easier to understand. We also do a lot of field trips and we have guest speakers.
- -The playground in the middle of nature is awesome. I was used to a concrete playground.

I feel that my daughter became less shy, she came out of her shell. She's a happy girl and we are glad we chose this school for our children. We felt welcome from day one and already have some friends. Thanks to the active parents organization, you get the chance to get involved and help the school. This is different than in Belgium.
